

# STAR IN AG BUSINESS

#### Will Wheat, Har-Ber

Will Wheat has an SAE in the area of agricultural services. He owns a business where he does freelance work creating promotional videos for various hunting and fishing outfitters and hunting and fishing equipment sales. Will says "It is an honor to be named a state star winner. I am using the money to invest back into my business."

William has an Entrepreneurship project in Agribusiness Systems that centers around his freelance advertising and marketing business, Dubsoutdoors, LLC, where he creates photo and video content for major outdoor brands in the hunting and fishing industry. Starting with borrowed camera gear, he grew his business through mentorship, reinvestment, and a \$1,000 SAE grant—eventually acquiring his own equipment and taking control over client contracts, creative direction, and production management. One of William's greatest accomplishments is a recent project of creating a documentary about the bond between childhood friends created through hunting and fishing trips.

# Star in Agriscience

#### Caleb Green, Lamar

Caleb has an Agriscience project where he, along with fellow Lamar FFA member Grant Miller, tested consumer preference among four types of eggs—farm fresh brown, farm fresh blue, commercial white, and organic—through a blind taste test with 20 participants. Each egg sample was prepared identically and served randomly with water and crackers to cleanse the palate between tastings. Results showed that farm fresh brown eggs were the clear favorite, while organic eggs were the least preferred, with commercial white and farm fresh blue eggs falling in between. This project was made possible through the support of Dr. Hanning and the University of Arkansas Poultry Science Department, their teacher, and school administration, who provided resources, guidance, and time to conduct the experiment.

Caleb says "competing in the AgScience competition opened up my mind to new ideas by designing research projects, and challenged me to learn new things that I didn't know existed. One of my favorite parts was conducting a research experiment at the University of Arkansas in the Poultry Science department, working alongside professors that do research as a career."



# STAR IN AG PLACEMENT

#### Adalyn Hanning, Har-Ber

Adalyn Hanning has an SAE in the area of agricultural processing. She works as an unpaid employee at the University of Arkansas poultry pilot processing plant. She has created fresh, whole products as well as further processed products. Adalyn says "I am excited to be called a state star. I felt so accomplished to stand on stage and receive my award."

Adalyn has a Placement project in Food Products and Processing Systems in which she worked as an unpaid assistant in the University of Arkansas poultry processing pilot plant. She supports meat science research projects by helping process and evaluate poultry products. Adalyn's greatest accomplishments include gaining hands-on expertise in grading broiler breast myopathies, expanding her knowledge of poultry processing operations through research and industry tours, and contributing to meat quality research focused on key industry challenges like woody breast and white striping.

# STAR FARMER

#### **Emilio Smith-Gomez, Decatur**

Emilio says, "My SAE project goes beyond my livestock shows as I have bred our own show lambs for years. This has taught me herd management and encouraged me to take care of my lambs as best as possible. Healthy lambs are happy lambs."

Emilio has an Entrepreneurship project in Animal Systems in which he began in his childhood but grew significantly through FFA, expanding from market lambs to breeding Purebred Cotswolds, and later managing a full flock independently. His responsibilities increased over time, especially after his sister left for college, requiring him to take over all aspects of care, showing, and fitting for multiple breeds. His greatest challenge came when he added Southdowns and Lincolns to his flock, but through persistence and learning from mistakes, he mastered new skills and earned top honors at NAILE, proving the value of hard work and determination.


